Welcome to our Annual Review of 2013 which outlines our activities during the year and brings much encouragement as we recognise God's many blessings over the last year.

In 2012 we were challenged by the Lord to “Guard the Heart and Grow the Edge”. Guarding the Heart means that those who belong to GBC as their church family find they are well cared for and have opportunity to worship God in appropriate ways. Growing the Edge is a challenge to build strong links into our community by the whole church. The impact of this has been to see growth right across our church community. Much of this year's Review details the ways we have been blessed by God.

As a result, 2013 has seen us **responding to growth**. The word “full” is a regular adjective for many of our activities. Key to this have been the steps of faith to start our building project which is pressing our premises outwards towards the boundaries of our site. We have also sought to equip new leaders and open up to new areas of ministry especially amongst children, young people and families.

Also of special note in 2013 has been the remarkable growth of the **FoodBank** and the start of **HAMA** (Huntingdon Area Money Advice). Both are rooted in our commitment to the acts of kindness we see in the Bible. These are fine examples of our ministry in the public square.

And yet we were still challenged, as it happens at The Mix, to lower the bar for belonging to the GBC community. We needed to move beyond welcome to hospitality; to create a culture where people can simply belong without preconditions. Yet at the same time to raise the bar in our expectation of the transforming work that Christ can do within us – that we might become Shining Stars.





During 2013 Adrian Woodbridge's ministry at Medway Christian Fellowship continued to develop to a point where he joined them full-time in September. Significant new areas of mission have opened up on the Oxmoor estate for MCF and we have continued to share in the D-Caf ministry.

We also commissioned Abe Kalyapu for pastoral ministry in Zambia.

CONGREGATIONS

Almost everyone at GBC finds a home in one of our three congregations: Sunday morning Celebration, Songs of Praise, and Generation Rising. A new different group of people have been joining Messy Church. The diversity of style and content of each congregation provides us with a meaningful place to worship God. When our congregations meet, they are also places of learning and prayer. Our local mission activities feed into our congregations and our small groups give people deeper and closer relationships for discipleship and support.

We twice ran the Journeys course in 2013 for those wanting to find out more about the Christian faith.



During 2013, many new people have begun to be part of our church family. Adults involved in the life of GBC increased by about 20% to around 300. Three people testified to their faith in believers' baptism, seven people became church members, and we shared five dedications of children.

Prayer surrounds everything we do, but from time to time we set aside specific times for concentrated prayer. Of special note were the early morning prayer times in Holy Week and The Prayer Space during September.

We support world mission across all our congregations, regularly sharing news of people overseas who are linked to GBC.

Many people enable us to celebrate the goodness of God, to share our lives with each other and to make disciples in all our congregations. We thank them for giving their time and gifts and for sharing their servant hearts.

SUNDAY MORNINGS

Our Sunday morning congregation has continued to grow and we use every inch of space on a Sunday morning in our Worship Area and in all the other rooms that are bursting at the seams with all our babies, children and young people.

We have benefitted from preaching series from Matthew (Vintage Jesus), Habakkuk (When God Seems Unfair), 1 Thessalonians (The Real Deal), Psalms and Genesis (Joseph: Inside an Outsider).

Our growing band of worship leaders and musicians have led us in sung worship and others have used their gifts to help us draw near to God. We are glad that a number are also able to use their gifts in support of other local churches, including regularly leading worship at Yelling Baptist Church and Medway Christian Fellowship. Crèche, Little Stars and Kids Kingdom, our growing Sunday morning children's ministry for 0-11s, and Furnace for 11-14s continue to provide an excellent age appropriate teaching programme during our Sunday celebrations.



SUNDAY EVENINGS

The content and style of our Sunday evening services varies from week to week but regularly includes healing and communion services and a focus on one of our overseas or local missions.

SONGS OF PRAISE

Every third Sunday at 4.00pm, our Songs of Praise congregation meets for a short service with well loved hymns, readings, prayers and a short talk. Up to 80 people have been coming and then many stay and enjoy tea together – and the chance to meet others and spend time chatting. It has been a real joy this year to see a growing number of people from our Tuesday Lunch Club and Holiday at Home attending Songs of Praise and feeling that it is their spiritual home.

GENERATION RISING

Generation Rising has continued to develop through the last year with young people getting more and more involved in all areas: leading worship, leading the services, running the PA and projections and making cakes. A highlight of the year was Generation Rising's first baptismal service when Sam Graham was baptised.



"I have had lots of opportunities to be involved at GBC in 2013, with my baptism and with being around and helping with lots of practical jobs around the place. This has all given me time and space to grow nearer to God and to think about what God wants me to do in the future."

Testimony

Testimony has played a significant part in our lives together at GBC during 2013. People have shared in moving and helpful ways with each other about God's blessing on their lives. Sometimes this has been during worship services and this is a particular facet of our Songs of Praise

services. Sometimes people share in other settings, such as prayer triplets, small groups and friendship groups. A number of people have faced, and are still facing, very difficult circumstances. Two of them have agreed to share some testimony in this Review booklet.



“In July 2013, after many tests and investigations, it was recommended that I undergo a Total Pancreatectomy as my pancreas was peppered with cysts showing a raised potential for future malignancy. This procedure involves the removal of the pancreas, duodenum, gall bladder and spleen

together with part of the stomach and some ducting. New connections are then made. This was rather a lot to take in but God in His goodness:

- *gave real peace and strength in times of fear and weakness*
- *ensured that this procedure was carried out in time and just at the right time*
- *enabled the preservation of my spleen which is VERY rare during this type of surgery*
- *caused the ‘textbook perfect’ responses of my body during this long and complicated procedure*
- *confirmed that the decision to have surgery was right as signs of very early changes (not requiring any further treatment) were found*

And He continues:

- *granting me a heightened awareness of His love, presence and care in ALL circumstances*
- *causing many different people to shower me with great kindness*
- *healing my body much faster than expected*
- *helping my family and me to adjust to my new ‘normal’*
- *enabling good control of my diabetes and digestion*

I don’t know why God has allowed my family and me to go through all of this rather than lifting us out of it but I do know that He is good to us, far above anything that I can expect or imagine. I know that I can trust Him completely whatever happens.

I am convinced that the assurance, strength and many blessings given to me are the result of God hearing and responding wonderfully to the prayers of my church family and others. I hope that on reading this you will be greatly blessed and encouraged as I have been.

What a wonderful God we have and what a wonderful Christian family I belong to. Thank you so much for your faithful prayers, your support, your love and your kindness. I'm not quite 'out of the woods' yet so please do keep praying!" Trudy

*Having grown up in the Anglican Church I have been mindful of the words in the Communion service, which say '**at just the right time**, when we were still far off', God did something amazing in Jesus. And this is where I am focusing as 2013 finishes and 2014 really gets going, not on time whizzing past but rejoicing that at the right time, God brought us into GBC, He has given us support in an amazing way, we have had time together at home, both of us have stopped work, God has given us enough money to manage on. So in all these things it has been 'at just the right time'.....*

Small Groups

We continue to work out our vision of being a small group community in many ways with people ‘loving, learning, doing and deciding’ together – whether that is in a prayer triplet, a team working together in many of our services, activities and events, or a small group.

community singing and poetry; our now traditional bingo with plenty of quality prizes to be won; and the daily quiz. Community

FOODBANK



The work of the foodbank is motivated by Jesus' teaching on poverty and injustice.

We operate according to Christian principles of compassion, honesty, integrity, openness, kindness and care of all people, regardless of backgrounds or beliefs. We believe in turning faith into

practical action, living out God's love for the poor by seeking to fulfil Matthew 25:35-36 "For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me..." Whilst we are part of the local church, we serve people of all faith groups and beliefs or none. We are passionate about inclusion and being non-judgemental is central to what we do. We believe that everyone has the right to have food on their plate, dignity, skills, a chance to work and hope for the future. The foodbank is there to help people in the local community in a time of crisis by providing a place where they can be listened to in a non-judgmental way and receive practical help.

2013 was a busy and exciting year for the foodbank with lots happening. The start of the year saw the formation of a steering group and the commencement of open house sessions, thus relieving some pressure from the church office. Opening twice a week, a team of volunteers are available to welcome visitors to the foodbank and provide a listening ear over a hot cuppa. 562 parcels have been given out during these open house sessions, feeding over 1000 adults and children.

During the year the foodbank has become much more widely known, both nationally and locally. We have joined the Trussell Trust, the national network of foodbanks, and benefitted from the increased publicity and profile this has brought. The foodbank now has its own website godmanchester.foodbank.org.uk which has attracted 1,111 hits in the last

four months of the year from 771 unique visitors. Locally, members of the team have given talks to a number of groups, including community groups such as the Women's Institute, day time groups at other churches and statutory agencies within the local authority as well as three interviews on local radio. In October we hosted a Showcase event when we welcomed guests from local agencies and community organisations along with people from local church congregations who came to find out more about the foodbank and even have a tour of the stockroom. We now have 55 agencies registered with the foodbank who hold vouchers to refer those in need.

In the autumn we assisted the Churches Together in St Ives, led by the Parish church, to set up a foodbank in St Ives by operating as a satellite to Godmanchester foodbank for a few months until they were established. Having decided that joining the Trussell Trust was not for them they have now branched out to be an independent foodbank in their own right.



In the summer our stock fell very low and we put out a request for food. The response was amazing and our shelves have never been empty since. Many have supported the foodbank with ongoing donations, both from within our own and other local congregations and from others in the local community who regularly bring in donations. We had two supermarket collections at

Huntingdon Waitrose, one in May and another in September. In addition we took part in the Trussell Trust national supermarket collection at

Tesco at the end of November, when we were overwhelmed by the generosity of shoppers and collected 2,597Kg. A number of local primary schools held harvest festivals and donated their offerings to the foodbank. To everyone who has donated we say a huge THANK YOU. We could not do this without you.





We finished the year with our Christmas hamper project. This was a massive undertaking, but with a huge amount of preparation beforehand by Jude, it took a large team of volunteers just a few hours to pack and distribute 94 Christmas hampers which provided not just the basics but some Christmas

treats too. Hampers were given to families and individuals who would otherwise not have had much to eat at Christmas, and were very well received.

New for 2013 **HAMA** (Huntingdon Area Money Advice)

Pay freeze; bedroom tax; benefits cutback; increased energy costs, and so on and so on.

All of us are aware of the changing economic environment in which we live. For many of us it means a bit of tightening of the belt; for some it is devastating. Debt is an increasing problem in our society – and the offers of quick fixes like pay-day loans seem very attractive when you have no money left at all, but like so many of these things it is “too good to be true” and the problems escalate. And of course once in debt it is hard to get out of it and the light at the end of the tunnel gets forever darker and you end up dreading the phone ringing or someone banging on your door because it is just the next person harassing you for payment with money you don’t have.

In October 2013 the churches in the Huntingdon area set up a money advice service to help those in the local community – HAMA. It operates out of three centres, with GBC being one. It helps people with debts – preparing a debt management plan, negotiating with creditors on behalf of the clients, and assisting with budgeting. People approach HAMA for help themselves or are referred to HAMA by others such as social housing groups. HAMA is staffed by volunteers, three of whom are part of the GBC

family, who provide their services free of charge to any who seek its help. It offers appointments to clients Monday to Saturday, during the day or evening. In the four months that HAMA has been going about 30 people have sought its help. If you are interested in supporting the work of HAMA or know of someone who needs help with money matters, please speak to Keith Doe, Geoff Collett or Roger Hickling.
