


THE GOD WHO SPEAKS



Prayer (i) Poem by George Herbert


Prayer (i)

PRAYING WITH IMAGES

(Visio divina)

A picture may indeed be "worth a thousand words."

Visio Divina is translated as "divine seeing".

Many of us were taught to close our eyes when we pray but this form of prayer involves keeping our eyes wide open, taking into our heart what the image visually communicates. This is prayer without words, with a focus on being in God's presence rather than performing in God's presence.

The images could be works of art, paintings, sculptures, stained glass windows, icons, or even photographs. It can evoke deep personal emotions and needs, even things we were not conscious of, which we can pray about.

What you see in an image is probably different from what others see. These images are doorways into stillness, into closeness with God. If we sit with them long enough, we too can enter into the stillness and if we listen to them closely enough, we just may discern the voice of God.

The message you hear from God, spoken to you in part through the image, is personal to you. Why not try it with the pictures posted on this board.

We are each wired in different ways, but the richest prayer life will come through experiencing God through all your senses.

In the Bible, poetry, music, dance, storytelling, and art are all used in worship and prayer because all touch and transform the deep, inarticulate places in human hearts.
